Handwriting	Learn printed letter formation alongside phonics using the Letters and Sounds Programme Learn letter formation using 'shape families': Straight line print letters: I l t	Sit correctly at the table, holding a pencil comfortably and correctly. Begin to form lower case letters in the correct direction, starting and finishing in the right place. Form capital	Form lower case letters of the correct size, relative to one another. Start using some of the diagonal and horizontal strokes needed to join letters, and understand which letters are best left unjoined.	Continue to develop their joined up handwriting. Increase the legibility, consistency and quality of their handwriting – for example, ensuring that downstrokes of letters are straight and parallel, not sloping.	Write with increasing legibility, fluency and speed. Choose which shape of a letter to use, and decide whether or not to join specific letters. Choose the writing implement that is best suited for a task.
